World War II deaths:

- Soviet 24M (10M military, 14M civilian) (13%)
- China 20M (3.5M military, 16M civilian) (3%)
- Germany 7.7M (5.5M military, 2.2M civilian) (10%)
- Poland 5.6M (almost all civilian) (17%)
- Dutch East Indies 3.5M (almost all civilian) (5%)
- Japan 3.1M (mostly military) (4%)
- Philippines 800K (60K mililitary, 750K civilian) (6%)
- UK 450,000 (380K military, 70K civilian) (1%)
- U.S. 418,500 (virtually all military) (.3%)
- Australia about 40K (mostly military) (.6%)
- New Zealand about 12,000 (1%)





















OSAKA BECOMES STEAMING CAULDRON. Smoke and flames holl skyward from Osaka after 8-29 Superfortresses raided the second largest city and industrial center of Japan. 


